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MT members across the combine will shortly be receiving ballot papers for industrial action to fight back against LUL plans to cut jobs, reduce safety standards and throw out hard-won agreements. Below, some of Finsbury Park's officers and reps explain why they will be voting YES in the ballot.



Dean O'Hanlon, Branch Secretary

'A vote for industrial action will send the message loud and clear that you do not want to work for a company that puts money before safety. Station jobs will be first for the chop. But the intended dumbing down of the rulebook will remove the safety role of station supervisors and undermine driver responsibility. This, coupled with the upgrades projects (Tories have already said they want driverless trains) makes it clear

that management want a McDonald's style environment with minimal safety responsibility for operational grades, speeded up and dumbed down training (e.g. 3-day CDP) and far fewer staff in the future. Already, management are disregarding their own policies and union agreements: they have introduced false targets for attendance, sacked drivers who are fit for work, robbed you of the full performance bonus by fiddling the final CSS score, and threatened drivers who refused to work on grounds of safety. A YES vote will reverse this trend and ensure that your union has a strong voice in the work place, your job is defended both in the short and long term and you are respected at work rather than treated as a customer service slave who can be disciplined or sacked with impunity. **Vote YES**.'

'Vote YES as a driver in the stations job cuts dispute, unless you want to run the gauntlet in no man's land every time the sun goes down and the idiots come out to play on your train!'

'800 job cuts on stations, and more on the way. We have to resist and protest, fight back. We can only do this together, by CSAs, SAMFs and Supervisors all sticking together. Every cut will increase pressure and stress, is unsafe and will attack promotion for us all. Together we are strong. We stopped them before over ticket office cuts - we can do it again. 'For CSAs these proposed cuts mean more extreme shifts, a poorer work-life balance, vulnerable working conditions and little or no promotion prospects. 'The time has come when the economic environment is having a direct impact on safety on London Underground. Sadly, we as front line staff are bearing the brunt of mismanagement through the years of PPP and back. The outcome:

- Job losses
- Restructuring of our responsibilities as professionals
- A massive dumbing down of our training procedures
- Management no longer adhering to the company's own policies and agreements

If you can't negotiate then your only remaining option is to withdraw your labour. Our unity will force management to stop dictating and start listening.'

'The loss of 800 station staff jobs will affect everybody. Fewer staff, sometimes even no staff at all, to assist drivers. Fewer station staff means a bigger workload for the remaining staff. More customer complaints and hostility towards station

staff due to the deterioration in the service given. This is an attack on our working conditions. If management get away with this they will come back

for more job cuts, pay cuts, banked rest days and our pensions. We have to take a stand and fight these attacks while we still can. **Vote YES for industrial action and action short of a strike.** Use your vote and make it count.'

'In not so many words, management have said that they are coming for all grades including drivers! They are doing that by giving us more responsibilities, telling us to accept new procedures which, if done now, would see us sent to DB. We need to all stand together. We need to let them know we are more than just numbers. This strike needs to be supported by all grades to protect all grades.'

them not to pull emergency handles in the tunnel and wait till you get to the platform for HELP! WHAT HELP! HELP FROM WHO!'

We've seen what's in it – the unfair sackings, the bullying, the blatant failure to abide by agreements and policies, and the attacks on jobs, service levels and safety. Driverless trains may be a fair way off, but the idea has recently been floated by the Tory GLA group and shows clearly the direction of their thinking. It's all about cutting to the bone and creating an Underground run on the cheap. It's a future which does not include many of you. And for those who survive the axe, it's a future without job security, without the historic railway safety culture, without the terms and conditions which used to make the Underground a decent place to work. We didn't get where we are by doffing our caps to management. Neither are our terms and conditions the result of management generosity or enlightenment. We have what we have through many years of united struggle. We are now facing a severe test; if we fail it, we will rapidly lose everything that has been fought for in the past. That will represent a betrayal of those who fought for a decent workplace, a betrayal of our own interests and betrayal of our children whose working lives will be truly grim compared to how it was when many of us started out. There's no room on the fence here. We need to show a strong, united response and a willingness to defend our livelihoods and quality of life. Vote YES and be part of the solution.
